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"FASTING"

Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? - Isaiah 58:6

"What are you giving up for Lent?" That is a question that one often hears as the season of Lent approaches. Perhaps you have chosen to deny yourself something over the course of the next few weeks. The practice of fasting has been associated with the Lenten season for centuries. Fasting is most often associated with giving up certain foods or food altogether.

Fasting is an ancient ritual. It was quite common during biblical times as a sign of mourning and was often accompanied by other physical acts such as weeping, lament, putting on sackcloth, etc. But God was not always impressed with the Israelites and their fasts. Prophets like Isaiah often challenged the people about the sincerity of their "sacrifices."

Jesus fasted for 40 days and nights in the wilderness prior to his encounter with the devil and the devil's temptations. Jesus also gave instruction on proper fasting as part of the Sermon on the Mount: "When you fast, do not look sullen like the hypocrites, for they make their faces unattractive so that people will see them fasting. I tell you the truth, they have their reward. When you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that it will not be obvious to others when you are fasting, but only to your Father who is in secret. And your Father, who sees in secret, will reward you." – Matthew 6:16-18

So, if you want to give fasting a try this Lenten season, might I suggest the following. This was posted on Facebook and shared with me. It is from Pope Francis and I think it is well worth passing on.

DO YOU WANT TO FAST THIS LENT?

- Fast from hurting words and say kind words.
- Fast from sadness and be filled with gratitude.
- Fast from anger and be filled with patience.
- Fast from pessimism and be filled with hope.
- Fast from worries and have trust in God.
- Fast from complaints and contemplate simplicity.
- Fast from pressures and be prayerful.
- Fast from bitterness and fill your hearts with joy.
- Fast from selfishness and be compassionate to others.
- Fast from grudges and be reconciled.
- Fast from words and be silent so you can listen.

May God blessings accompany you throughout your Lenten journey!

As is usual in February, I am enjoying sunshine and warm temperatures (at least warm relative to Kendrick!) on the central California coast. Also as usual, I attend church in the nearest town, and last Sunday a woman named Nita Hansen spoke on her work in Ukraine. In the mid 1990's she felt called to go there without the slightest idea of what she was being called to do. What she did was to start an aid organization called God's Hidden Treasurers, depending totally on the leadership and provision of God to help her meet the challenges presented to her.

These challenges were mammoth. The first thing she did was to finally wheedle her way into one of many orphanages, which did not allow visitors, and found that they contained many children damaged by Chernobyl, plus other children who did not meet the standards of their parents and were just dumped into orphanages. Parents would simply try again for a better child. These children were stashed according to age in dark, cheerless rooms with wall-to-wall beds or cribs. Nita said the orphanage director told her she was the first person who had ever come in the name of Jesus to help. Nita also went into the "homes" of many disabled and elderly people who were basically being ignored and starved out. One woman she told of had lived in the burned-out remains of a house where she had been confined for years. Nita was appalled at the conditions she saw, and over the last 25 years she has worked to bring relief and the love of God to some of the terrible ways people were having to live. Through God's Hidden Treasure she has obtained all kinds of aid, including many wheel chairs to give mobility to some of the handicapped adults and children. She didn't set out to consciously DO anything –she let Christ lead her and provide what she needed, and He did so—richly! Over the years her purpose grew: go—stay—love, and SHOW the love of Jesus. She never poked anyone in the chest and ask if they were saved, but she made it clear **Who** was helping them because **He** loved them, and that what she did was because of that same love.

As Nita was giving her presentation, she was NOT fundraising or asking for anything. She simply talked about the miracles she'd seen, with complete faith that those who know of and support her work will respond when God places needs in front of her.

We at Cameron can show the same kind of response to people we don't know, even without knowing their stories. Again, members are being asked to bring donated items for Lutheran World Relief personal care kits during Lent. These items: towels, nail clippers, soap, combs, and toothbrushes, are so ordinary to us. All we have to do to get them is go to Phil's or Costco or to the hall closet to get more. But to people like those in Nita's Ukraine, they are close to unattainable. These simple items may not even be in stores, and if they are, few can afford them.

We have been sending these kits for several years, and I can imagine a faint groan: "Again?!?!? Yes, again, because need never stops. Nita's descriptions of some of the conditions she found really brought home how incredibly fortunate we are. In our collections of kit "ingredients" - even from this distance—we can show the love of Christ to those who have between very little and nothing. Theses kits often go where there have been disasters where whole areas have been destroyed, and maybe even combing the tangles out of their hair raises people's spirits know someone cared enough to give them that little bit of hope.

Lutheran World Relief so beautifully illustrates Nita's go—stay—love faith. Please bring items knowing that you are responding to and spreading the love of Jesus!Ann Taylor



Items for each kit-

- ◆ 1 light-weight bath-size town (between 20"x40" and 52" x 27") dark color recommended
- 8 to 9 oz. bars of soap in original wrapping
- 1 adult-size toothbrush in original packaging
- 1 sturdy comb
- 1 metal nail clippers, attached file optional





Thank you to the 27 who attended Emmanuel's **Annual Meeting** January 26. Annual reports are available upon request, if you did not receive one. In financial matters, the current account ended with a \$142 deficit, however special funds, memorials, and estate gifts made an overall balance of \$28,753.

It was approved to continue giving 12% of undesignated offerings to the Synod; Interest from the Mission Endowment Fund (\$2360) would go to 40% Young Adults in Global Mission, 30% VBS, 20% Choir, 10% Food Bank; Thrivent Choice income of \$2589 would be used for The Lutheran subscriptions and church insurance. The **2020 budget** of \$89,075 was presented and approved.

Communion schedule will normally be the 1st & 3rd Sundays but offered every week in Lent and on Festival Sundays.

In an attempt to pull us into the 21st Century,
Ryan Lawrence & Loralee Ohrtman will set up a
webpage for our church information and events in
addition to our Facebook account. Janet Boyer, Don
& Ann Parks and Russell Brammer volunteered to
work on revision of our constitution.

It was agreed to continue with the Guardian Heating's maintenance agreement for the **oil furnaces** in the parsonage and church. There are very few who still service these and at some point we may need to upgrade. The **photocopier** may need to be replaced sooner than later.

The pump for the well is at 6.25 gallons per minute and currently producing enough for the parsonage & church. Discussion brought forward options of leaving the well & pump as is, installing a higher gallon per minute pump, or installing a reservoir system. More bids will be pursued if changes are to be made.

Other maintenance needs include painting the exterior of the addition, removing overgrown shrubs and one of the older out buildings behind the fireplace.



MONEY MATTERS MARCH 8 EVENT

Beth Adams, Regional Gift Planner for the ELCA Foundation will be with us on Sunday, March 8 to share information with the congregation about establishing a second endowment (a Legacy **Stewardship endowment**). A light lunch will be served in conjunction with the March birthday celebration and Beth will present a program about estate planning, bequests, and legacy giving. She will then outline what would be required to establish an endowment and answer all questions we may have about the process.

At the annual meeting, the **Mission Investment Fund** was suggested as an alternative to use to help us to be better stewards of the gifts our congregation receives. The MIF is a separate ministry of the ELCA from the Foundation, but Beth may be able to answer basic questions about the MIF.



5 Now when Jesus saw the crowds, he went up on a mountainside and sat down. His disciples came to him, ² and he began to teach them. He said:

³ "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

⁴ Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted.

⁵ Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth.


⁶ Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.


⁷ Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.

8 Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.

⁹ Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

¹⁰ Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.





Lent is a solemn time of directed spiritual focus. Beginning with Ash Wednesday, it is a time to remember that from dust we came and to dust we shall return. Do we meditate or contemplate this somber attitude enough. During Lent we often engage in a practice of fasting from something in order to remember the suffering of Christ. In our small sacrifice, we remember Christ's ultimate sacrifice for us.

How does this connect to the beatitudes? The passage begins with the people sitting down and learning from Jesus. We too, during this set apart time, are meant to sit at the feet of Christ and remember his suffering and how he taught us to live.

Reading the beatitudes reminds us what Jesus considered blessed. When we are poor in spirit, when we mourn, when we are meek, when we are hungry and thirsty for righteousness, when we are merciful, when we are pure in heart, when we make peace, when we are persecuted—this is when we are blessed. As we remember the death of Christ, may we also remember that we need to die to our own presuppositions of what it means to be blessed. These simple phrases may be common ideals for those of us who have been in the Christian faith, but they are no less revolutionary.

In the same way, it may be common to pause for 40 days in remembrance of Christ's death, but it is no less revolutionary. May we gather at Jesus's feet and be taught. May we sit in our poor spirits, our mourning, our meekness, our hunger and thirst, in a merciless world, a chaotic world, and seek the kind of blessedness that can only come from a resurrected savior who needed to suffer and be crucified in order to bring this revolutionary kingdom.

Practice: Pray through each beatitude, asking the Holy Spirit to make you more and more kingdom-minded. Which beatitude is most revolutionary to you? How can you practically engage in sitting in Jesus's teaching this Lenten season?
